

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



If you have just 2 days in Zion, then stick with Zion Canyon and maybe spend 3-4 hours visiting Upper East Canyon at the end of your second day. See page 73 for more info on the East Canyon.

If you want a break from Zion for a day, please see our Greater Area Attractions section (page 88). Here we list 10 amazing activities to do within a 1-hour drive from LaFave in Springdale.

6 STEPS TO A GREAT EXPERIENCE AT ZION

DAY 1

1 Get an early start. Yes, we know you're on vacation, but starting early helps beat the crowds and the heat.

2 Go to the Zion Canyon Visitor Center area. Take a peek inside to gather current park info and trail conditions.

3 Board the free shuttle tram up the canyon. If you are hiking, then take the designated stop for whatever hike you've selected. If you are just sight-seeing, then get acquainted with the canyon beforehand by reading our guide to Zion Canyon on pages 70-71. There is also a free audio narration on the shuttle.

Go hike – after all, that is what Zion is most famous for! There are numerous hikes to choose from in Zion Canyon. Please see our hiking guide on page 45.

If you want an easy hike, then do the paved 1-mile Riverside Walk — it starts at stop #9 (The Temple of Sinawava). If you are hiking the Narrows, this is also your stop. If you want to hike something challenging, then get off at the Grotto (stop #6) and hike either Angel's Landing or the West Rim trail (bottom up route). If you want a moderate hike, do the Upper Emerald Pool trail hike via Kayenta Trail (also stop #6 The Grotto).

5 After your hike, consider visiting the shops and galleries in Springdale (see page 97).

6 You've worked up an appetite – go grab some food in town. See our restaurant guide (pg. 99) for our recommendations.

DAY 2

See our hiking guide on page 45 and find another spectacular hike to enjoy.

In the late afternoon or evening consider visiting the Upper East Canyon. See page 73 for more info on the East Canyon.

WHAT TO DO AT ZION

RYAN, STAFF-MEMBER AND #1 ZION FAN, GIVES US THE PLAY-BY-PLAY FOR HIS PERFECT DAY AT ZION

RYAN'S PERFECT DAY AT ZION:



8:30 AM - Catch the shuttle up the canyon.

9:15 AM - Arrive at the Temple of Sinawava (last stop #9).

9:30 AM - Leave to hike the world-famous Zion Narrows. I don't stop until I reach Big Springs 5 miles up the canyon (Big Springs is as far as you can go without a permit). I never get tired of the Narrows, no matter how many times I've done it. Pro tip: after a couple of miles up the canyon, the crowds will thin out.

4:30 PM - Arrive back at the Temple of Sinawava; shuttle down the canyon.


5:15 PM - Arrive back at the visitor center.

7:00 PM - Eat a big dinner at the Bit N' Spur or Wild Thyme. After dinner, stop by the Bumbleberry Ice Cream Shop & Bakery to sample their delicious hand-dipped ice cream treats.

9:00 PM - Go back into the park to do some star-gazing along the Pa'rus trail.





Zion National Park is one of the most popular national parks in the U.S. in terms of number of visitors each year. While always well-liked, in recent years Zion's popularity has exploded.

Zion now hosts 4.7 million visitors annually. Zion consistently ranks in the top 3 or 4 most visited national parks each year in the U.S.— well ahead of notable parks such as Yosemite and Yellowstone.

Utah famously has some of the best desert red rock scenery in the world—indeed, all of Utah's 5 national parks lie in the desert south. Zion is unquestionably the crown jewel of the Utah national parks, and it sees more visitors by far than any of the other Utah national parks.



OVERVIEW OF ZION NATIONAL PARK

Z ion National Park is located in the southwestern United States, near Springdale, Utah. Zion encompasses some of the most scenic canyon country in the world. The park is characterized by a maze of deep sandstone canyons, tall mountains, clear rivers, colorful mesas, narrow slot canyons, prominent monoliths, and high plateaus covered with pine forests. Zion also features one of the largest freestanding arches in the world: Kolob Arch spanning 310 feet.

Less known about Zion: with an abundance of water and high canyon walls to shield the sun, the park contains many seeps, springs, and waterfalls supporting verdant and colorful hanging gardens. Visitors are often surprised at the relative lushness found here.

Zion National Park contains evidence of at least 8,000 years of human occupation by Archaic, Ancestral Puebloans, Southern Paiutes, and later the pioneer settlers who arrived in the 1860's. In the 1860's, pioneer members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormons), named the area **Zion, a Hebrew word interpreted to mean a place of safety or refuge.**

With an elevation change of over 5,000 feet, Zion's unique topography leads to a diversity of habitats and species. Desert, riparian (river bank), pinyon-juniper, and conifer woodland life zones are found here. Zion is located at the junction of 3 major regions: Mojave Desert, Great Basin, and Colorado Plateau, which contribute to the unusual diversity of plant and animals species of Zion.

The park's ecosystems support over 1,020 native plant species, including more flowers than anywhere else in Utah. 44 of the plant species are endemic to Zion.

Zion is home to 78 species of mammals, 291 species of birds, 37 species of reptiles and amphibians, and 8 species of fish.


This zone is 45 minutes from Springdale. Very scenic and few visitors.

HIGHLIGHTS: Timber Creek Overlook trail (1 mile), the Taylor Creek Trail (5 miles), and the 14-mile Kolob Arch Trail – at 310 feet, it's the second largest arch in the world.



Although rarely visited compared to the main Zion Canyon, this section of the park is extremely beautiful and has few crowds. If you want an otherworldly scenic drive, then head up this road in the late evening and be prepared to get amazed.

HIGHLIGHTS: The Kolob Terrace Road zone is how you access many great hikes in Zion such as the Subway, the West Rim Trail (top-down route), and Northgate Peaks Trail.



×**** Zion Canyon

Zion Canyon is the zone that most people are coming to see. The main Zion Canyon holds most of the famous sites. This narrow, deep canyon is the centerpiece of the Park. This zone is so busy that for 9 months of the year you must take the free shuttle to access Zion Canyon.

HIGHLIGHTS: The Narrows, Angels Landing, Emerald Pools, The Great White Throne, Court of the Patriarchs, etc.

**** Upper East Canyon

This section of the park is accessed through the Zion-Mt Carmel Highway with its famous 1.1 mile tunnel built by the C.C.C. in 1930. This zone of the park is underrated—it contains some of the most scenic sandstone peaks and canyons found anywhere on earth. We highly recommend visiting the East Canyon you won't be disappointed. This zone is much less crowded than Zion Canyon.

HIGHLIGHTS: The Canyon Overlook Trail, Many Pools Trail, the Checkerboard Mesa, and numerous scenic side canyons. This zone has the best bighorn sheep viewing.

WHAT MAKES ZION SO SPECIAL?

Water is what makes Zion unique

People come to Zion to view the awe-inspiring desert canyons and towering sandstone monoliths — but what really makes Zion unique is the abundance of water. Compared to the other Utah national parks which feature mostly dry, barren landscapes, Zion features water everywhere you turn.

The park's ecosystems support more than 1,000 native plant species, including more flowers than anywhere else in Utah. Add this oasis greenery to the deep canyons and dramatic mountain peaks of Zion, and it's a mix that millions of people cannot resist year after year.

It is this uncanny alignment of stone and water that has captured the popular imagination. There is simply no other place like it on earth.

ZION NATIONAL PARK BIG SPRINGS

THE VIRGIN RIVER

The Virgin River and its tributaries run through Zion National Park. This river is the primary erosion agent that has sculpted Zion for over 13 million years.



THE VIRGIN RIVER



In 2009, the upper section of the Virgin River and its tributaries were given the rare designation of a Wild and Scenic River

The North Fork of the Virgin River begins its journey north of Zion Canyon at Cascade Falls, 9,000 feet above sea level. Then the river runs through the park and empties into Lake Mead, 1,200 feet above sea level. As the water drains below the Hoover Dam, the Colorado River continues its journey to the Gulf of California.

The North Fork of the Virgin River drops 7,800 feet in the 160 miles it travels. In the park, the river drops an average of 70 feet every mile. In comparison, the Mississippi River drops about one inch every mile. Although small, the dramatic elevation drop and constant down-cutting force of the water continues to carve out the deep canyons of the park.

The Virgin River usually runs low with an average volume of 100 cubic feet per second. However in times of great rain, it can flood and carry vast amounts of sediment. On average the river transports one million tons of sediment a year. Most of this sediment transfer occurs during floods when the river can temporarily swell to a flow of thousands of cubic feet per second. These floods can carry large boulders and rip out trees from the river banks.



INSIDER TIPS FOR PLANNING YOUR ZION TRIP



THE SHUTTLE SYSTEMS

Zion National Park & Springdale

Instead of driving to Zion Canyon, where there is limited parking, leave your car parked for free at LaFave. Take the free town shuttle that leaves directly from in front of LaFave and it will drop you off at the park entrance.

Then board the separate park shuttle at the visitor center. Take the shuttle up Zion Canyon and get off at the 9 stops to explore the wonders of Zion. The final shuttle stop ends at the Temple of Sinawava (where the Riverside Walk and the Zion Narrows begin).

PARKING Zion National Park & Springdale

We recommend taking the free town shuttle directly from LaFave in Springdale to avoid trying to find parking in Zion. The town shuttle is a convenient way to get around Springdale instead of driving.

We have a Springdale town shuttle stop immediately in front of the LaFave property to easily get around town and into the park. There is parking to be found in Springdale, but it can be crowded and expensive during the busy season (but not nearly as bad as trying to find parking in Zion National Park).



WHERE TO EAT

Where to eat: we have 5 great restaurants within walking distance of LaFave. We would recommend all of these 5 restaurants. See page 99 for LaFave's full restaurant guide and recommendations.

Because each of the rental units at LaFave has beautiful full kitchens plus an outdoor grill, cooking at LaFave is also a great option. We have 3 grocery stores in town. We recommend Sol Foods Supermarket to purchase groceries (located just 0.3 miles up the road).

INSIDER TIPS FOR PLANNING YOUR ZION TRIP



AVOIDING CROWDS

If you are going up Zion Canyon, the best advice to avoid crowds (other than coming in the early spring or winter season) is to leave early in the morning or later in the afternoon/ evening. Both of these times of day also offer cooler temperatures to beat the summer heat.

If you really want to avoid crowds, then we suggest visiting two other zones of Zion that see far fewer visitors (and still offer jaw-dropping scenery): the Upper East Canyon and the Kolob Terrace Road zone. Both of these sections are about a 20-30 minute drive away in your car (the shuttle only operates in the main Zion Canyon).

ZION WILDERNESS

And our final insider tip: Have a wilderness experience on your trip to Zion!

We recommend having at least one type of wilderness experience before you leave: do a remote hike, explore a slot canyon, hike to a remote vista, or find a place to disappear (even if only for 30 minutes).

Although Zion may be crowded, there are still many places in the park to disappear and reconnect with nature.



NAVIGATING THE ZION SHUTTLE SYSTEM

There are two free hop-on, hop-off shuttle systems: one for Zion National Park, and one for getting around town in Springdale.




The canyon views from the shuttle windows are unforgettable. For the current shuttle bus schedules, please see the information book in the LaFave guest rooms or visit NPS.gov/Zion. As a general rule of thumb, the shuttles run at least every 5-15 minutes in the busy season starting at sunrise and going a little past dark.

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20 years ago the park decided to establish a shuttle system within the main Zion Canyon section of the park. The shuttle was necessary due to the lack of parking spaces within the park. Except for winter, you must ride the bus to enter the main Zion canyon. For many visitors, the 50 minute shuttle ride to the top of the canyon is one of their favorite experiences of visiting the park.


Despite the crowds visiting each year, Zion still manages to exceed expectations. The visitors simply love the Zion experience evidenced by the fact that they come back and also tell their friends about the wonders of the park. From talking to our guests (and seeing the high reviews from the park visitors) we witness the satisfaction visitors get from experiencing this special place.



ONE MAN'S TAKE ON THE ZION CROWDS



Despite the crowds—no, because of the crowds— Zion still feels like a celebration.



Although the Mighty Five parks are too crowded, I wouldn't say they're ruined. Last summer I was in Zion on a busy weekend. With 4.5 million annual visitors, Zion is by far the most packed of the Utah parks (and was the fourth most visited U.S. national park in 2018). The horror stories about the lines and the crowds are all true.

But I had a blast.

Twenty years ago, the park made the visionary decision to shut Zion Canyon to cars. Everyone leaves their cars at the visitor center, the campgrounds, or the town of Springdale and takes a shuttle to the trail-heads for Angels Landing and the Narrows. So there are no traffic jams, no motor homes circling for a space. From the tops of the sandstone cliffs, the valley below is silent.

Better than any front-country park in the entire nation, Zion has realized Ed Abbey's dream of carlessness: "You've got to get out of the contraption and walk," he pleaded, "better yet crawl, on hands and knees, over the sandstone and through the thornbush and cactus."

At Zion, though I was rarely less than ten feet from another human, I didn't have that soul-sucking "park experience" endemic to Old Faithful in Yellowstone or the South Rim of the Grand Canyon, the feeling of inching forward on asphalt, then shuffling in a herd a few hundred yards to a vista, only to return to the confines of the car.

I never saw so many fit Americans concentrated in one place, bedecked with hydro packs and hiking poles and amphibious footwear, hustling at the crack of dawn to hike ten miles with steep exposure, risking heat stroke and hypothermia in the same day. Despite the crowds—no, because of the crowds—Zion still feels like a celebration.


But above all, it is the perfection of its form and the authority of its presence that have made Zion one of those few monuments that burn into our memory.

The hike is set high above the rest of Zion sitting at 7,000 feet above sea level, which makes it cooler in the hot summer. The trail winds through majestic ponderosa pines and open meadows as well as offers sneak peeks into remote. wild canyons. The trail ends with a beautiful vista of the Northgate Peaks and the North Guardian Angel. This is a relaxed hike that is perfect for families. A suggestion on the time to do this hike: drive up in the evening and be rewarded with some of the best views in Zion with the late sun hitting the mountains on the Kolob Terrace-it looks like something out of a movie. Then do the hike in the cool of the evening and be rewarded with stunning views and the setting sun hitting the Northgate Peaks.



Recommended time to do this hike is early morning or late evening when the light casts an orange glow on the mountain peaks above.

DESCRIPTION: Along with Angels Landing, this is the most famous hike in Zion. And yes, it is crowded in the summer. But make no mistake: it is worth it! The Narrows is the best hike you will do in Zion-and the most memorable. Hiking the Narrows is a singular experience: where else can you say that your hiking trail was the river bed? And the canyon walls rising over 1,000 feet directly overhead gives the feeling of being in a stone cathedral. You don't just see the Narrows—you feel it. Hiking the Narrows is a must-do-preferably from the top downbut if you can't swing a top-down permit, then the next best thing is to hike from the bottom up to Big Springs. Pro tip: if you hike a mile or two up the canyon the crowds will thin out. Pro tip #2: for this hike you should get a walking stick or trekking poles (and boots are also nice to have). Stop by Zion Adventure Company or Zion Guru to get outfitted.

Very few people on this hike since it is out of the main Zion Canyon. A good alternative to the Emerald Pools hikes if you're looking to ditch the masses.

Pro tip: many people struggle to find the trailhead for this hike. The parking for the trailhead is on a wide pull-out on the right (there is now a restroom at the parking area). The hike begins to the west (across the road) up a little canyon. Or if you prefer: immediately descend to the east from the parking lot down the dry wash. When you reach the sandy bottom of the wash turn left (west) and go up the canyon — you will cross under the road in a tunnel. Using this method you can't miss the trailhead.

DESCRIPTION: You have heard of this hike: Angels Landing is perhaps the most famous hike in Zion. Many people come to Zion just to do this one. It is awesome, it is scenic, and it is scary. If you are severely afraid of heights, it's probably best to sit this one out. However most people are still able to do this hike because the park has placed chains to hold along the route in the most treacherous sections.

As of 2022 a permit is required to hike Angels Landing. However if you are not able to secure a permit, you can still do the hike and see most of the same stunning views by simply hiking up the same trail and stopping at Scout Lookout. Without the permit you won't be able to climb the final summit ridge up Angels Landing— but Scout Lookout is not a bad consolation prize. One advantage of the Scout Lookout hike is that it doesn't have the severe height exposure found on Angels Landing.

DESCRIPTION: This is one of the top-3 hikes in Zion. If vou are looking to do a classic hike that isn't in the water e.g. The Narrows, then this is arguably the best hike in Zion. The views are beyond description and the crowds are close to non-existent (at least on the first 12 miles of the hike until you run into the Angels Landing hikers). This hike starts off casually, but then continues to build and finally climaxes with some of the most jaw-dropping views of the park of any hike. On this trail you get to see the upper sections of Zion that fewer than 1% of all visitors to the park ever get to see. I can't recommend this hike enough. If you do the top-down hike, the route is almost all downhill which makes it considerably easier (unless you have bad knees and you'll be feeling it by the end). One important note: there is a trail junction where you can choose to take Telephone Canyon-don't take it-stay on the West Rim trail (to the right) or you will miss the best views this hike has to offer.

You walk up the same trail as those hiking Angels Landinghowever instead of turning right at Scout's Lookout to summit Angels Landing, you instead stay left on the main trail and continue up to the West Rim. This hike is strenuous in that you climb a lot of vertical feet fairly quickly-however the views are sublime the entire hike to take your mind off your pounding legs. As this hike is an out-and-back you can make it as long or as short as you want. The farther you go, the better the views-if you have the stamina to reach the upper plateau you get rewarded with arguably the best vista in all of Zion looking out from the West Rim. No picture can do this vista justice-it must be seen in person.

DESCRIPTION: This is the best hike in Zion. People come from all over the world to hike the Narrows from the top-down for a reason: it is a magical hike like nothing else on earth. Do the work to obtain the required permit and the logistics for this hike and you will not regret it. The advantage of doing the hike from the top-down is that you get to see the entire canyon and follow it from a tiny stream to a deep canyon cut 2,000 feet deep from the conyon rim by the end of the hike. Another advantage of going from the top-down: the park strictly limits the number of daily hikers from the top to 40 permits a day—so you get solitude in the canyon for a true wilderness experience (at least for the first 12 miles).

If this hike does not move your soul, then I don't know what in nature could. It is a sacred experience to walk through these corridors of stone cut by water over the last 6 million years. This hike is unquestionably authentic and offers the exhilaration of a true wilderness escape. It must be experienced at least once in your lifetime.



Only a tiny percentage of the 4.7 million people who come to Zion each year get to see the Subway—be one of them! Permit required.

DESCRIPTION: The views from the top of Observation Point are mind-blowing and among the very best in the park. The view is worth the work to do this hike. Observation Point is much less crowded than Angels Landing with even better views. Also, it is not as sketchy as Angels Landing for those afraid of heights. Currently the route via Echo Canyon is closed due to rockfall. When the Echo Canyon route is open it is one of the best hikes in Zion. You may still access Observation Point via the East Mesa Trailhead. This may be accessed from the East Canyon side of the park. Although the hike in from the East Mesa route is not as dramatic as the route via Echo Canyon, the end view is still the same. And the advantage of the East Mesa Trailhead route is that the elevation change is minimal compared to the very steep Echo Canyon route coming up from the Zion Canyon floor.

SIGHTSEEING & EXPLORING ZION CANYON

Select Zion Canyon Tour Highlights

One of the best excursions is to take the free hop-on, hop-off shuttle bus up the main Zion Canyon and enjoy the views of this world-famous canyon. The main Zion Canyon holds most of the sites that Zion is known for: the Narrows, Angels Landing, the Emerald Pools, The Great White Throne, the Court of the Patriarchs.



1. Before you board the shuttle, start by checking out the Zion Canyon Visitor Center and view the exhibits and maps of the park. There is also an excellent bookstore to peruse.

Then board the tram to go up the canyon. At stop #2 there is a little museum to check out the history and peoples of the park (Zion Human History Museum). 2. As you re-board the shuttle and enter the main Zion Canyon, get off at several stops to take in the views and let them inspire you. Note the canyon walls that rise to the rim more than 2,500 feet above.

Some of the towering monoliths that you see rise over 3,800 feet above the canyon floor! Observe the massive boulders that have come crashing down from high above over the many eons. **3.** As you go further up the canyon, envision what it was like to visit this canyon hundreds or even thousands of years ago when Native Americans gathered here to hunt.

Or imagine what life was like more recently as a pioneer farmer in the 1800's, such as the Behunin family that settled here in 1863, and lived near the site of today's Zion lodge. The canyon floor was farmed all the way up until 1909 when Zion became a monument.

4. Continue on in the shuttle up past stop #6 and note Angels Landing come into view. Next up is The Great White Throne, one of the most impressive peaks in the park (and subject of many artistic works).

As you pass stop #8 at the Big Bend Viewpoint, get out and look up to the high ridge to the west. Here you can see the hikers as little dots 1,000 feet overhead working their way up the Angels Landing hike. Also, if you have keen eyes, you can see the rock climbers here, scaling the sheer vertical walls on a multi-pitch route which sometimes can take several days. 5. In 2019, a family of California Condors nested on the cliff directly below the trail up to Angels Landing and successfully hatched a chick. This was a big deal that attracted national media attention. Visitors from all over the world came to see the condors.

We had guests at LaFave that visited from all the way across the country just to see these majestic birds that sport wingspans up to 10 feet. 6. Take the shuttle to the last stop (#9) at The Temple of Sinawava. This is where the canyon begins to narrow and the paved Riverside Walk begins. It goes for 1 mile until the Zion Narrows begin.

If you have time and you are able, get out and do this Riverside Walk. It's easy, and it's extremely beautiful—the river and the canyon look majestic here. If you were to continue on and walk up the Narrows hike, eventually the canyon walls taper down to just 20-30 feet!



This road is a National Scenic Byway. There are many incredible vistas to be seen in this section of the park highlighted by the Checkerboard Mesa and numerous scenic side canyons. Also on this route is the Canyon	
urmine (manmoc Ta			Overlook Trail that begins immediately as you come out on the east side of the big tunnel. Take time to enjoy this scenic drive to the East Canyon zone: get out of the car, explore the many beautiful side canyons; gaze at the majestic mountain peaks, view the desert bighorn sheep that thrive in this section of the park. Do the 1-mile Canyon Overlook Trail or the Many Pools Trail for a welcome stretch of the legs—both hikes are short. Added bonus: the crowds are light here. Also, this area of the park has the best bighorn sheep viewing—we see the bighorns nearly every time we visit the East Canyon. This zone of the park is underrated—it contains some of the most scenic sandstone peaks and canyons found anywhere on earth. We highly recommend visiting the East Canyon— nobody comes away from visiting this area disappointed.



If you have time, drive all the way up to Kolob Reservoir, at nearly 9,000 feet in elevation. This alpine 	
				 lake offers a pleasant contrast to the desert climate in Zion Canyon. The Kolob reservoir outlet is Kolob Creek, which drains into the Zion Narrows and offers hard-core canyoneering for those with the proper training and gear. The Kolob Terrace Road zone is how you access many great hikes such as the world-famous Subway, the West Rim Trail (top-down route), and Northgate Peaks Trail. The Northgate Peaks Trail is a great diversion to stop and hike while on this drive. You access this hike at the Wildcat Canyon Trailhead. The Northgate Peaks Trail is an out-and-back hike — so you may make it very short — or go the full 4 miles round trip. This hike is extremely flat and easy. The hike sits high above Zion Canyon at 7,000 feet above sea level, which makes for cooler temperatures. There are no crowds here. The Northgate Peaks trail goes through majestic ponderosa pines and open meadows as well as offering sneak peeks into remote, wild canyons. The trail ends with a beautiful vista of the Northgate Peaks. This is a great hike to do in the cool of the evening and make it back to your car just before nightfall.

There is a small visitor's center at the entrance of the canyon that has a few exhibits and features a small bookstore.



The Kolob Canyons truly are a unique area of Zion National Park, with soaring peaks of Navajo sandstone, canyon streams and cascading falls, and over 20 miles of hiking trails.

Some of the prominent hikes that begin in this section: Timber Creek Overlook trail (1 mile), Taylor Creek Trail (5 miles), and the 14-mile Kolob Arch Trail — at 310 feet, it's the second largest arch in the world.



Viewing the Sunrise and Sunset at Zion

One of the best places to watch the sun hit the Zion cliffs in the morning is right from the grounds at LaFave. Most mornings the sun will bathe the West Temple Mountain (directly above LaFave) with a warm, soothing orange glow. At sunset you can look east from LaFave and see a dramatic vivid neon orange on The Watchman Mountain.

STARGAZING

Stargazing at Zion

The stargazing in and around Zion is awe-inspiring. Springdale has strict dark-sky city ordinances to limit light pollution to enable prime stargazing. The dark night sky, filled with thousands of stars, rises above the jagged silhouette of the cliffs to frame an unforgettable view.

Eighty percent of Americans live in an area where they cannot see the Milky Way due to the light pollution of the cities. With little to no light pollution in Zion, the Milky Way is indeed milky: you can distinctly see the Milky Way band. Some LaFave guests have commented this is the first time they've ever truly seen it.

Two recommended hikes in Zion to view the night sky: Canyon Overlook Trail and the Pa'rus Trail.

Here the kids can splash in the river, play in the grassy field, catch frogs in the late evening, and enjoy a walking path over the bridge on the east side of the river. Obviously don't let the kids in the river if it is running too high or fast.
- **4. Tubing on the Virgin River.** If your kids are older: go tubing down the Virgin River through town. Zion Outfitter rents tubes. They can give you specific info on where to get in and out and if conditions are safe.
- 5. Zion Rock & Gem. Take the kids to Zion Rock and Gem (it's a two minute walk south of LaFave on Highway 9). Show them the amazing fossils and cool rocks and gems native to Utah. Maybe even buy them a souvenir.
- **6. Horseback Riding.** You may ride either in Zion (visit canyonrides.com for info) or out of the park at Jacobs Ranch (see ziontrailrides.com).

WILDLIFE VIEWING

ion sits at the junction of the Colorado Plateau, Great Basin, and Mojave Desert zones and thus contains a broad variety of animals. With elevations ranging from 3,700 feet to over 8,700 feet, the park encompasses 5,000 feet of elevation change in 232 square miles. With so many varying heights and resultant microclimates and habitats, it is no surprise that Zion is home to over 78 species of mammals, 291 species of birds, 37 species of reptiles and amphibians, and 8 species of fish.

Some of the animals you may encounter at Zion:

- Bighorn Sheep if you want to see the sheep, head to the East Canyon zone
- Mule Deer abundant all throughout the park and in Springdale
- Cougar almost never seen—nocturnal
- California Condor in 2019 a pair nested and raised a chick in Zion Canyon
- Wild Turkey can often be seen in the orchards on the south end of town
- Peregrine Falcon nest every year in Zion Canyon
- Canyon Tree Frog these cute little guys can be found in many streams & canyons abundant in The Subway & Many Pools hike
- Squirrels & Chipmunks several species found throughout the park
- Desert Tortoise rarely seen. endangered
- Lizards collared lizard, leopard lizard, chuckwalla, whiptail, horned
- Gray Fox can be seen mornings and evenings as they avoid the heat of the day
- **Bobcat** elusive member of the cat family
- **Badger** can be seen in the lower desert zone of the park
- Hummingbird found throughout the park and in Springdale
- Ringtail The ringtail cat (a relative of the raccoon) is abundant in Zion. However, this small omnivore is rarely seen. They seldom emerge before total darkness. Using great skill and agility, they maneuver Zion's high cliffs and balance on narrow ledges with the help of a long ringed tail.







Q. First of all: what is canyoneering?

A. Canyoneering is the exploration of a canyon from point A to point B using a range of techniques that may involve hiking, rappelling, scrambling, route finding, and swimming. Canyoneering allows you to see much more remote and secluded landscapes than you could by simply hiking. Canyoneering is the intimate exploration of a forgotten Earth. It is an exhilarating adventure and crazy-fun.


Zion National Park is considered a mecca for canyoneering with several worldfamous canyons like the Subway, as well as countless obscure and remote canyons to explore in the surrounding area. The park and surrounding area offers dozens of canyons to explore, suitable for both beginners and experts. Some of the canyons here are considered world-class. Canyoneers from all over come to experience the magic of these special descents at Zion.

Q. What if I have no experience canyoneering? Can I still do it?

A. Yes. If you have limited experience, the best method is to go with a professional guide service. Perhaps the best guide service is the Zion Adventure Company* (see zionadventures.com). Simply contact this company and arrange for them to take you on a canyoneering trip. They will discuss your abilities and adventure level to tailor a canyoneering trip that is mild, medium, or wild. I recommend the Zion Adventure Company as I have personally used their guide service and found them to be knowledgeable, safe, and fun.

Although most people who visit Zion do not go canyoneering, I would recommend it. It is a way to get off the beaten path and do an adventure that will create vivid, lasting memories. And the scenery in most of these canyons is spectacular you will witness otherworldly sights that 99% of visitors to Zion do not get the opportunity to see. Most of the slot canyons feature beautifully sculpted walls, and sometimes spectacular waterfalls.

ROCK CLIMBING

ROCK CLIMBING

Zion is a climber's paradise. Zion National Park's 2,000-foot sandstone cliffs are world-renowned for their big wall climbs. Due to their difficulty, most routes in the park are not recommended for inexperienced climbers.

BOULDERING

There are two accessible bouldering areas in the main canyon. One is 40 yards west of the south entrance. There is a house-sized boulder that poses a variety of options and problems. The second is Drilled Pocket Boulder, located 0.5 mile north of the south entrance. It is located on the west side of the road and is a slab with an obvious south-facing crack.








Alex Honnold

ong before Alex Honnold became the subject of a 2019 Oscar award-winning documentary about his free solo efforts in Yosemite, he was scaling peaks in Zion. In 2008 in Zion Canyon, Alex awoke early one morning and without telling anyone he quietly ascended the 1,200 foot Moonlight Buttress route in just 83 minutes. But what made this climb historic was that Alex did it with no ropes or protection—just him and the rock—known in climbing circles as "free soloing."



Everyone thought he was crazy, but over the years Alex continued to build

his climbing resume with even more daring free solo ascents. But it was way back in April of 2008 in Zion that Alex first received national attention for his audacious climb of the Moonlight Buttress.

About the Moonlight Buttress Climbing Route:

Moonlight Buttress is rated 5.12c—if that doesn't mean anything to you, that's okay. Suffice it to say 5.12c is insanely hard and that most climbers (even after years of practice) cannot climb 5.12. But to do so without ropes is not even a consideration!

The Moonlight Buttress climbing route is near the Angels Landing hike and can be seen from the road just past the Big Bend stop #8. As you go by, look up because often times the route has climbers on it. But unlike Alex, almost every one of them are using ropes.

MOUNTAIN BIKING

MOUNTAIN BIKING NEAR ZION

he mountain biking is so good in the Zion region that there is an entire mountain biking subculture that resides here. There are an endless number of epic trails in this region — too many to list in this guide.

Keep in mind that mountain biking is only allowed on the Pa'rus Trail within Zion National Park. You may also ride on the roads in Zion — but if biking on dirt is what makes you happy, then you will need to get your fix outside the park boundaries.

We will leave it to other guidebooks to give you all the detailed info on mountain biking in the greater Zion area. But, as a quick teaser, these 3 mountain biking trails are arguably the best trails close to Zion (see sidebar). So if you have some experience mountain biking, and you want to hit the trails for a day, then head over to Zion Cycles in Springdale to rent a mountain bike and experience the magic of a ride here.

OF THE BEST MOUNTAIN BIKING TRAILS NEAR ZION:

1. GOOSEBERRY MESA TRAIL SYSTEM

Perhaps one of the most well-known trail systems in Southern Utah for its world-class trails full of technical singletrack, rolling slickrock, and incredible views of Zion National Park. The trails are wellmarked with signs at the junctions and spray paint markers on the slickrock to keep you on track. You'll get both the challenges and rewards of riding on the bare rock. With miles of singletrack that can be linked together on the mesa, there are options for beginner to advanced riders.

2. THE WHOLE GUACAMOLE (11 mile loop) Advanced trail that offers a good challenge with amazing views. Guacamole has a little bit of everything for riders. Start on slickrock and move to singletrack as you venture further out on the loop. The outer loop has some very nice singletrack.

3. JEM TRAIL (13 mile trail)

If you're looking to go fast, enjoy the views, and not worry about climbing too much, while still getting a nice section of technical switchbacks in, then the JEM Trail is for you. There are a variety of beginner/ intermediate to advanced options, with quick little splits along the trails for the advanced mountain biker. JEM is a classic of the area, and has been thoughtfully designed with mountain bikers in mind— plenty of flow and fun bermed corners.

CYCLING IN ZION

Q. IS RIDING BIKES ALLOWED IN ZION NATIONAL PARK?

A: YES.

Bicycling is permitted on all park roadways and on the Pa'rus Trail. All other park trails, off-trail routes, and the Zion-Mt. Carmel Tunnel are closed to bikes.

Your best option is the Pa'rus Trail (1.75 mile one-way paved trail) which starts north of the visitor center. The Pa'rus trail connects you onto the Zion Canyon Scenic Drive. You can then ride another 6 miles all the way up Zion Canyon to the Temple of Sinawava. It's one of the best ways to experience Zion Canyon and avoid the canyon shuttles. You may park your bike at one of the many bike racks in the canyon to hike a trail, or just enjoy the scenery as very few get to do—on a bike! If you get tired of biking, each shuttle has a rack for at least two bicycles.

Bikes may be rented at Zion Outfitter (located right before the park entrance on the west side of the bridge) or Zion Guru.



Looking to ditch the shuttle bus? Consider renting an e-bike*

Would you like to head up Zion Canyon in a different method than taking the shuttle? Try renting an e-bike and see the canyon with unobstructed views.

With an e-bike you may skip the park shuttle and avoid parking hassles. Enjoy a casual, stress-free day among the towering cliffs of Zion. E-bikes may be rented from the Zion Adventure Company in town. Zion Adventure Company claims: "with pedalassist, you can bike the Zion Canyon Scenic Drive to the Temple of Sinawava in half the time it takes to ride the shuttle."

*What's an e-bike? An electric bike is simply a bike with a small electric motor to aid you in pedaling. It feels like a regular bike, only much easier. When you pedal, the motor gives you a boost—you control how much. It makes for much easier uphill climbs.

Kanarraville Falls



50 minutes away from Springdale is one of the most accessible and picturesque slot canyons and waterfalls in southern Utah. The creek side trail is fairly short (3.5 miles round-trip) and lies on the easy/moderate scale—little kids will often be seen on the trail here. Be aware that Kanarravile has been "discovered" in the past 5 years and they're now limiting access to 150 hikers per day. This is a nice little hike and falls. Worth doing.

For the more adventurous: climb the ladder above the first falls, and then hike up to the lesser-visited (but no less impressive) second falls. Permit required and \$15 entry fee.


St. George is the closest semi-large city near Zion. St. George has lots of shopping, restaurants, 10+ golf courses, the arts, and several notable attractions.



Looking for a day outside out of Zion National Park? Try these local area attractions:

ST. GEORGE UTAH ATTRACTIONS

- Snow Canyon State Park Gorgeous red rock canyon near St. George. Called by some "Zion's little brother," Snow Canyon is an impressive canyon that contains several desert landscapes. It has some of the best sightseeing and hiking in southern Utah on a variety of trails, including a cool petroglyphs hike. \$10 entrance fee.
- **Red Cliffs Desert Reserve** The Red Reef Trail is great for families wanting a short, easy hike with scenic views. Leave from the campground at the Red Cliffs Recreation Area into a narrow canyon beside a small stream. As you hike, the canyon narrows until it is just a few feet wide. You will come to a little waterfall that blocks the trail you may climb to the right and then continue up the narrow canyon. The Red Reef trailhead is 45 minutes from Springdale. Free entry.
- Tuacahn Catch a Broadway-style performance at the renowned Tuacahn outdoor amphitheater. For show info visit tuacahn.org.
 Shows play all summer and fall. It is usually sold out nightly—advance reservations recommended.
- Little Black Mountain Petroglyph Site Technically in Arizona (just over the Utah border), this site contains some of the best-preserved petroglyphs in southern Utah. Accessible by a short nature trail. The dirt road in can be a bit bumpy. Free entry.






ST. GEORGE UTAH ATTRACTIONS (cont.)

- The St. George Temple Visitors' Center Visit one of the original temples for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormons) who first settled this area in the 1860's. The temple was completed in 1877—the first in Utah. Other pioneer sites to see in the area: the St. George Tabernacle (opened 1876), the Brigham Young Winter Home, and the Jacob Hamblin House.
- **The Vortex Hike** 30 minutes outside St. George is a hike that ends in a naturally shaped bowl (or Vortex) in the Navajo sandstone. It is a bit out of the way—but a nifty little hike with amazing views and a cool destination. It's rather short (just over 2 miles) but moderate in difficulty due to the terrain. See hikestgeorge.com for info. Free entry.
- Kids Activity Idea: Red Hills Desert Garden This 5-acre garden features 5,000 water-efficient plants, a 1,150-foot stream with native and endangered fish species, a replica slot canyon and prehistoric dinosaur tracks found on site dating back 200 million years. While here, visit the Pioneer Park and St. George "narrows". These outdoor park areas are located right next to the Desert Garden and offer fun outdoor play areas to explore the natural red rock formations, including a cool little slot canyon and mini-arch. Free entry.
- **Sand Hollow State Park** Experience boating, paddle boarding and scuba in a calm lake surrounded by sandy beaches and red rock cliffs. Rental gear and equipment available in Hurricane. ATV rentals also nearby. Entry fee required.
- Yant Flat Hike (aka the Candy Cliffs) Colored sandstone formations that sport views similar to the Wave in AZ without having to draw a permit. The rocks have the appearance of swirled hard candy; in other places the weathered sandstone looks like giant reptile scales. The trail is short, flat, and easy: 1.2 miles one-way. Once you reach the cliffs, work your way east along the rim for a half-mile until you reach a huge natural bowl area that has the best rock formations. Yant Flat has a herd of wild horses that roam here. Avoid this hike in the heat: go early or near sunset. The dirt road in is smooth and suitable for cars (4-wheel drive not required). Very sparse crowds.

SPRINGDALE UTAH OVERVIEW



Springdale Utah serves as the gateway to Zion National Park.



Springdale has a rich history going back to 1862 as members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormons) settled here and forged a difficult existence out of the wilderness. Life was hard—but rewarding. Eventually outsiders came to behold the beauty of this awe-inspiring place. Zion was formed as a national monument in 1909.

Springdale was named one of the 20 "prettiest towns" in the U.S. by Forbes Traveler. Come see the charm of this magic little town next to Zion.



Springdale has the full amenities of a resort town with numerous restaurants, brew pubs, and coffee joints — along with many shops and art galleries. It is a walking town and sports wide-open sidewalks, which encourage the visitors to stroll the town and explore.

SPRINGDALE UTAH OVERVIEW

Springdale is a city of the arts and music — with many art galleries, shops, and a large music festival each fall that draws thousands of visitors.

Springdale is the perfect base camp for your Zion trip. LaFave is located in the heart of Springdale, and sits 1 mile from the south Zion National Park entrance. LaFave features a free Zion shuttle stop directly in front of the property.



As you walk around town, gaze up at the Zion Canyon monoliths that rise 3,800 feet above the town.



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



On our property at LaFave, we have a well-kept pioneer stone corral that runs along our property boundary. We have preserved this piece of history as a way to honor these <u>early settlers</u>.

> The land around Zion has a rich history. At LaFave, we are proud that our property carries a heritage of the rugged American West and pioneer spirit.

In 1862, the early pioneers of Zion carved a difficult existence out of the desert landscape with few tools and materials.

Before there was barbed wire fencing, the pioneers of Utah would construct stone corrals to contain their animals. In several of the national parks in Utah, you may still see remnants of these early stone fences.





Premier Villa Floor Plan












